Doerr	<i>All the Light We Cannot See</i>	From the highly acclaimed, Pulitzer Prize winning author, the stunningly beautiful instant <i>New York Times</i> bestseller is about a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths collide in occupied France as both try to survive the devastation of World War II.	Europe
Shaffer, Mary Ann	<i>The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society</i>	January 1946: London is emerging from the shadow of World War II, and writer Juliet Ashton is looking for her next book subject. Who could imagine that she would find it in a letter from a man she's never met, a native of the island of Guernsey, who has come across her name written inside a book by Charles Lamb. Written with warmth and humor as a series of letters, this <i>New York Times</i> bestselling novel is a celebration of the written word in all its guises and of finding connection in the most surprising ways. Nor does it explain that the sisters were among the leading opponents of Gen Rafael Leonidas Trujillo’s dictatorship. It doesn’t have to. Kamara & McClelland	<i>The Bite of the Mango</i>	As a child in a small rural village in Sierra Leone, Mariatu Kamara lived peacefully surrounded by family and friends. Rumors of rebel attacks were no more than a distant worry. But one day when 12-year-old Mariatu set out for a neighboring village, she never arrived. The heart-rending memoir chronicles her physical and emotional journey to the present, but stands as a testament to her astonishing courage.	Sierra Leone
Wiesel	<i>Dawn</i>	Wiesel’s first novel describes the vigil of Elisha, the sole survivor of a family murdered at Auschwitz, as he waits to kill an English hostage in British – controlled Palestine.	Europe

Required question:

1. Discuss the culture revealed in the setting of your book. How does it affect the plot?

Choose 4 additional questions:

1. What central conflicts exist in the novel (internal and external)? How do they contribute to the book’s overall meaning?
2. What positive and negative character traits did you identify in the main character?
3. What theme is revealed in the book? Explain.
4. Pick one important passage (Write the quote out) and explain its significance to the work as a whole.
5. What is the significance of the title? Use details to support your answer.
6. Discuss the narrator. From what point of view is the story told? How does the narrator’s bias affect the story?
7. What symbol(s) did you identify in the novel? Explain.
